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Letter from the Board of Directors

Donors, Friends:

We are pleased to share with you the Amazing Maasai Girls Project 2016 Annual Donor Report.

Following this opening letter, you will find a photographic round-up of last year's fundraising events, updates from our students, a summary of the AMGP's financials, and a full list of donors. We hope the report adequately demonstrates the life-changing impact of your incredible energy, commitment and ongoing generosity in 2016.

FUNDRAISERS 2016

The 6th annual Amazing Maasai Marathon was held to great success on July 29th 2016. For the first time, AMGP's sponsored students participated in the Half-Marathon, proving to themselves and everyone else just how Amazing they are! In addition, a record number of international guests participated through [Marathon Tours](#), and AMGP co-founder Sarah Soulie completed the Half Marathon.

Just six weeks later, the fun continued. On September 17th, more than 1,200 individuals in 43 locations across 23 countries joined the 3rd annual Global Run, donating a walk or run in support of girls' education in Kenya. The Global Run has proven a strong secondary source of scholarship donations and has greatly expanded the awareness and reach of AMGP's mission and activities.

GRADUATES & NEW STUDENTS!

As a result of your running and fundraising, nine of our students graduated high school last December, and this January another nine bright young ladies were awarded with four-year scholarships to St. Francis Girls Boarding School.

One key change in the administration of the scholarship program over the past several years has been the gradual increase in allocation of each year's scholarship award for attendance to St. Francis Girls Secondary School. Though the net effect of this change in strategy is a more conservative number of scholarships awarded, attributed to the higher cost of sending Amazing Girls to a boarding school over day schools Kimanjo Mixed Secondary School and Il-Polei Secondary School, we have seen a marked decrease in dropouts and improvement in grades.

High school is entirely life changing for smart young ladies from rural Maasai communities in Kenya. With the guarantee of four-year full-board scholarships, our nine newest girls have been afforded security, stability, and the hope of creating better futures for themselves, their families and communities. At school and with the help of our local team, they will learn the value of their own voices and will be given support in resisting the Maasai customs of childhood marriage and female genital mutilation (FGM).

Your help in 2016 has been, once again, pivotal in covering the otherwise unaffordable school-fees. Their scholarships will enable them to pursue the lives they dream of, beyond the boundaries of marriage and motherhood. For this, we cannot thank you enough.

FINANCIAL STATUS

More than US\$45,000 was raised with a \$40,000 profit, which represented a 45% increase in revenue from 2015 and a 25% increase in profit. It brings the cumulative scholarship funds raised since 2011 to over US \$196,000. A Profit and Loss breakdown is provided in the Financial Summary section on page 34.

UPDATES FROM ON-THE-GROUND

The Amazing Maasai Girls Project employs two local representatives, Solomon Kimani, our Scholarship Coordinator, and Agnes Mosiyani, our Girls Mentor. Each receives a stipend of 5,000KSH (approx. \$50) per month to carry out a range of duties relating to the students' academic performance and general welfare. This includes holding empowerment and anti-FGM workshops as well as one-to-one support.

In 2016, Agnes successfully began helping students apply and access government bursaries, which reduces school fees for students from the most disadvantaged backgrounds. Her work as mentor to the girls has also reduced the dropout rate to zero as we start 2017, which is just fantastic!

In other local updates, results for 2016 KCSE (Kenya Certificate of Secondary Education) final exams were hugely down from 2015, nationwide. As explained by Gill Elias, founder of AMGP partner [the OI Lentille Trust](#), this decrease in grades is "phenomenal and relates mainly to the culture of cheating across Kenya which has finally been addressed by the Kenyan government." It should be noted that we will have to expect more low grades in 2017.



The good news is that St Francis School, where the majority of our sponsored students now attend, are performing significantly better than most schools across Laikipia North.

As we head into 2017, the goal for the local team is to continue to support and monitor the students' welfare and academic performance, enforcing the AMGP's minimum grade requirements each term while remaining sympathetic to the current political climate relating to grading.

On behalf of the Amazing Girls, we would like to express our sincere gratitude to those supporting them in changing their own futures for the better.

Hellen Meshami

Hellen is studying at Lugari Teachers Training College in western Kenya. She told us: *"My career goal is to become a secondary teacher. My biggest challenge is that I am the only Maasai girl in the school who is pursuing the course. I would like to tell [the younger Amazing girls] nothing is hard - everything requires effort to achieve - and I would encourage them to put more effort in their studies."*

Lilian is studying Community Nutrition in Nursing. She told us: *"I like my career course since the focus is on the community so I can advise people that, despite of taking medicines when one falls sick, one can eat a certain diet which can heal or prevent that disease. I would like to advise the girls from my community that everything is possible no matter the challenges we undergo. The big challenge that I am facing is payment of school fees since this college is very expensive because one has to buy everything including meals, which has been a challenge to my parents since both are jobless. Thanks a lot and God bless you."*
